**SUBJECT:** Parental Right to Decline Examination Waivers

On April 7, 2020 the New York State Education Department (NYSED or "the Department") issued a <u>memorandum cancelling the June 2020 administration of Regents Examinations</u> and subsequently cancelled the <u>August 2020 administration of Regents Examinations</u> due to the COVID-19 health crisis. Due to the cancellations, the Department announced certain modifications to the assessment requirements that students must meet in order to earn high school diplomas, credentials, and/or endorsements. The modifications apply to all students enrolled in grades 7-12 during the 2019-20 school year.

1.) What is the purpose of the "Parent Right to Decline" process?

There may be a situation in which a student wishes to return to school rather than receive an exemption and graduate to finish his or her planned educational program and the parent or person in parental relation would prefer the child to continue to receive educational services for a 5<sup>th</sup> or 6<sup>th</sup> year of high school. In such cases the parent has the right to decline the exemptions leading to a diploma and elect to have their child remain enrolled in school for subsequent school years until s/he passes the assessments for which the exemptions were declined, or the school year ends in which s/he turns 21, whichever occurs first. However, parents and persons in parental relation must be fully informed that declining the exemptions shall mean that in the future, their child will need to pass any remaining assessments required for graduation including those previously eligible for exemption.

2.) Are there parent notification requirements a school must follow if students will graduate as a result of being exempt from one or more assessment requirements?

If a student with a disability has an individualized education program (IEP) and/or other Committee on Special Education (CSE) documentation that indicates s/he was planning to return to school to continue his or her education, but could qualify to graduate as a result of an examination exemption, can the school confer the diploma if no declination form has been submitted?

No. There may be a situation in which a student wishes to return to school to finish his or her planned educational program and the parent or person in parental relation would prefer the child to continue to receive educational services for a 5<sup>th</sup> or 6<sup>th</sup> year of high school.
